# **Principal's Report**

Dear HHPS Community,

It is with great pleasure that I write the very first newsletter for 2021.

I would like to take this opportunity to welcome all new families to our school, and to welcome existing families back. We have had an amazing start to the Term. All students have transitioned well into their new learning communities. The excitement on the student's faces as I walk through the Learning Communities is pleasing. This year we have introduced STEAM - Science Technology Engineering Art and Math as a specialist subject. The feedback that I have received already is proving that it is a welcomed addition to our specialist area. Hugh is leading STEAM at our school this year. Ask your students in Years Three to Six how they found it last week! It was also pleasing to see so many 'Harvest Home Heroes' around our school last week. In the Year One area alone 120 badges were handed to students displaying our school behaviours of 'Being our Best', 'Being Respectful and Being Safe.

## Masks

Following the Government's announcements regarding new state-wide restrictions that came into effect at 11:59pm on Wednesday 3 February, there is new guidance for schools regarding the wearing of masks. People aged 12 and over must wear a fitted face mask when in public indoor spaces unless there is a lawful reason not to. Any visitors to the office must wear a fitted face mask.

# Privacy Collection Statement- Victorian Government, Department of Education and Training's Schools' Privacy Policy.

During the ordinary course of your child's attendance at our school, school staff will collect your child's personal and health information when necessary to educate your child, or to support your child's social and emotional wellbeing or health in the school context. When our school uses these online tools, we take steps to ensure that your child's information is secure. If you have any concerns about the use of these online tools, please contact us.

School staff will only share your child's personal or health information with other staff who need to know to enable the school to educate or support your child, or fulfil a legal obligation.

When our students transfer to another Victorian government school, personal and health information about that student will be transferred to that next school. Transferring this information is in the best interests of our students and assists that next school to provide optimal education and support to students.

In some limited circumstances, information may be disclosed outside of the school (and outside of the Department of Education and Training). The school will seek your consent for such disclosures unless the disclosure is allowed or mandated by law.

Our school values the privacy of every person. When collecting and managing personal and health information, all school staff must comply with Victorian Privacy Law. ### Pride of Place


As we begin the new year, it is a timely reminder that Harvest Home Primary School has a uniform policy. The colours of the school uniform are navy blue and orange. HHPS uniform can be purchased from Primary School Wear (PSW) Danaher Drive, South Morang. Plain (non-logo) navy bottoms only (i.e. pants, shorts, skirt) are acceptable to complement the logo top options. Black shoes (school shoes or runners) are to be worn with the school uniform.

We appreciate that at the end of last year it was difficult for parents to obtain all appropriate uniform items due to shop closures. We look forward to seeing all of our students displaying one of our key principles 'Pride of Place' by being in full school uniform daily. The uniform must be worn correctly without fashion accessories or other enhancements (including non-uniform coloured pieces). Please make sure that every item of uniform is named.

#### **School Council**

# **Assistant Principal's Report**

## **Learning Communities**

At Harvest Home Primary School all students and teachers work in Learning Communities. Every child has a home group teacher that they begin and end the day with, however throughout the day they could be working with different teachers across their Learning Community. This includes lessons such as *Literacy (Reading, Writing and Spelling), Numeracy, Challenge-Based Learning (CBL) or Personal and Social learning* lessons.

Working collaboratively in this manner allows your child to develop relationships with various teachers and students. These flexible teaching options enable the teachers to cater for the individual needs of all students. The teachers use their knowledge and data sets relating to each student's learning and wellbeing to plan collaboratively and purposefully. This 'shared responsibly' allows all teachers in the learning community to learn from one another whilst still creating a range of learning experiences. We aim to give all students the best possible experience of 'school life' by providing them with adaptable learning spaces and student focussed opportunities that enable them to learn together and interact collaboratively.

The Year 1-6 students have begun the year learning the expectations of transitioning to different groups and spaces around each of the Learning Communities. For our middle-senior students this may mean moving from one portable to another, or up and down stairs. We support all students to do this in a safe and respectful manner. The teachers and students are very excited to begin their mixed groups.

You may want to ask your child who their Reading, Writing or Numeracy teacher is. Let's see if they remember!





Currently our Prep students spend most of their day with their home group teacher as they learn the structures and routines of school. As the year progresses, they will also have the opportunity to learn with the other teachers and students within their Learning Community.

## POSITIVE CLIMATE FOR LEARNING

It has been a busy and enjoyable beginning to our school year; where our families have returned with big smiles and we have welcomed many new families to our school community. It has been pleasing to see our students settle into their new environments, and begin to make connections within their learning communities and across the wider school community.



There is such a happy and productive hum across the school as our students have settled in beautifully, learnt new routines, reconnected with peers and developed new friendships. Within the communities, teachers have been working through our Positive Climate Startup program, which focuses on developing effective relationships, fosters opportunities for collaboration and provides supportive structures for a Positive Climate for Learning. Students have participated in many activities that provide relevant information for teachers and their peers about how students' interact, individually learn and collaborate to achieve an effective outcome. Such sessions may have explored the expectations of learning in a collaborative educational space, 'unpacking' our school values and the school logo, All About Me and Getting to Know My Peers activities.

## **Kaizen Awards**

- Praise your child/ren for their efforts at school and for any stamps, stickers, badges or awards they receive

# English as an Additional Language (EAL)

### **NEW EAL CURRICULUM IN 2021**

In 2021, the previous 'EAL continuum' becomes a learning area as part of the Victorian Curriculum F-10. The English as an Additional Language (EAL) Victorian Curriculum is central to the learning and development of all students for whom English is not their home language. Through learning EAL, students build their capacity to communicate confidently and effectively. This learning also strengthens their understanding of the nature of language and culture, and the way that language changes according to purpose, form and audience.

Through the EAL curriculum pathways, students develop English language competence in the modes of Speaking and Listening, Reading and Viewing, and Writing. Students are provided with a range of opportunities to expand their linguistic ranges, and one of the main ways to do this is through critical engagement with print and digital texts, including visual, multimodal and interactive texts.

It is important to note that the EAL curriculum provides opportunities for students to draw on their knowledge of the language/s spoken at home as a way to enhance their developing understanding of the English language. The inclusion of 'plurilingual awareness' in the curriculum acknowledges the value of competence in multiple languages.

The EAL curriculum aims to ensure that students:

- develop fundamental functional English language and literacy skills
- learn to listen to, speak, read, view, write and create spoken, print and digital texts, including visual, multimodal and interactive texts, across a growing range of contexts with accuracy, fluency and purpose
- understand how Standard Australian English works in its spoken and print forms and in combination with non-linguistic forms of communication to create meaning
- appreciate, enjoy and use the English language in all its variations and develop a sense of the ways it can be used to evoke feelings, convey information, form ideas, facilitate interaction with others, entertain, persuade and argue
- develop their plurilingual awareness of the ways they use different languages and the roles of these languages in their lives and identities
- develop their communicative skills, linguistic knowledge and cultural understandings in English and their other language/s, to enable their full participation in the Australian society.

In 2021 Academic reports for EAL students will be reported against the EAL Victorian Curriculum as this has been mandated by the Department of Education.

## **Online Programs**

As part of the Book Pack, students have access to some wonderful online programs to support learning. The programs are utilised in school and are a part of our Home Learning Expectations. Logins can be found in the inside of the Home Reading Journal/School Diary.



Wushka (in 2021 this is for Prep students only) is a cloud-based levelled reading program used at school and would love you to continue reading with your child at home. The program encourages students to engage with fiction and non-fiction texts on interactive devices. All School Readers are levelled from Level 1 through to Level 31+ and have been developed using decades of educational publishing experience. Recognising that the best outcomes are achieved when students continue reading at home, your child can use their login details received at school, to complete readers set by their classroom teacher, at home. Mathletic:

Your child is using **Mathletics** as part of their mathematics program at school. Mathletics is a targeted, rewarding and captivating online learning resource, which is aligned to curriculum standards. The extra Mathletics practice at home can make all the difference to your child's progress. It has a range of targeted and engaging activities that sets fun tasks that develop students' understanding of spelling on a deeper level. The program even allows for spelling tests that ReadiWriter Spelling can also correct. This additional focus on Spelling will support your child in developing their vocabulary and writing skills. ABC Reading Eggs is designed to get your child motivated and excited about reading. Your child will now be able to access the program in class and at home. They will work through the program at their own pace, focusing on phonics, letters, vocabulary, sight words, fluency and comprehension. Reading Eggspress is designed to build on reading and comprehension skills, and is usually for students in grades 2 onwards (7–13 year olds). There is also a built in library, where once again students can access a wide range of ebooks.



Sunshine Online offers schools the very best in animated and interactive digital content for Literacy and early Numeracy. The range of content options directly support our Curriculum. Animated and interactive, Sunshine Online offers an extensive digital learning environment with quality content for use in Literacy and Numeracy programs. We ask that if you want to bring something along to hand out to the students when celebrating a birthday, that you stick to non-food items, e.g. stickers, pencils, mini toys, keyring etc. Due to the range of students with allergies and food preferences, cakes/cupcakes are not permitted for sharing.

#### **SICK BAY**

Parents are reminded that if your child needs to be medicated during the school day, you will need to bring the medication to the Office in the morning and complete a form giving us permission to medicate your child. At the end of the day the medication must be collected by an adult and signed out.

#### FAMILY RESTRICTIONS

If you have any court orders relevant to your child could you please provide the school with a copy, to ensure their safety while in the school's care.
