Assistant Principal's Report

NATIONAL ASSESSMENT PROGRAM LITERACY AND NUMERACY (NAPLAN): COORDINATED PRACTICE TEST (CPT)

On Monday 23rd March, NAPLAN requires all schools that are completing NAPLAN online to conduct a coordinated practice test (CPT). The CPT is a national event that provides assurances of school readiness and student familiarisation of platform functionality; it enables detection of technical issues and assesses effectiveness of program monitoring and communications before NAPLAN testing in May. The tests will be conducted in both the Year 3 Tamboore and Year 5 Killara learning communities. For this reason it is very important that all students bring their (fully charged) IPads on this day (as per normal school process)

Whilst NAPLAN allows for some students to be exempt from completing Naplan, under very specific categories, as this is just a practice test with no data being collected or reported on, teachers will support all of our Years 3 & 5 students to complete these test/s. Year 3 will completed an omnibus test (a single test that includes questions from reading, conventions of language and numeracy) whilst Year 5 will do this test as well as a writing test.

More information will be communicated closer to the online Naplan testing period in May.

STUDENT VOICE AND LEARNER AGENCY AT HHPS

Harvest Home Primary School is committed to empowering our students to 'be the best' learner they can be. Kyle, who is one of our Learning Specialists and a community teacher in Year 5, is working on unpacking the key aspects and understandings of both voice and agency for our HHPS learners. Kyle is leading a team of enthusiastic teachers who will be asking lots of questions, reading lots of the 'evidence base' and collecting lots of our own contextualised HHPS data pertaining to voice and agency. As our HHPS families are one of our key 'partners' in each and every child's educational outcomes, it is hoped that in the near future families will be invited to participate in an online survey to gather thoughts around the type of learner and learning skills you want HHPS to develop and enhance throughout their years of primary schooling. More information will be shared with our families and the wider school community as this exciting work progresses throughout the year.

HOME LEARNING AT HHPS

Our Home learning expectations is one of the ways that we aim to build strong learning relationship between our students and their families. Home learning information handouts were given out to all families at our 'Meet the Teacher' in order to prepare families to support their child/rens learning. Next term the full 'suite' will be operational. A key element of the home learning is our take home reading. It is very important to remember that it is the nights of reading that is celebrated and not the number of books. We really encourage student to re-read books as to gain that deeper level of understanding which enhances their comprehension skills

In Week 1 of Term 2 on Thursday April 16th, we are planning a Family Information evening, which a series of workshops for our newest Foundation families to assist with the facilitation of HHPS Home Learning with their Prep children. More information will be communicated soon via Compass to our Prep families.

ONLINE SUBSCRIPTIONS

As part of every child's schools fees, we include our online subscriptions. All of the usernames and passwords for student who have paid for their fees has been now sent home. These are typically inside each students take home journal or school diary. It is advisable to also have a copy of these at home, so perhaps take a photos on your phones and save it, so it can all apps can be quickly accessed if the journal or diary is accidently left at school. In the later part of the newsletter, all the information relating to Mathletics, Spellodrome, Reading Eggs and Wushka can be accessed.

BYOD - IPAD PROGRAM (YEARS 3-6)

As stated in our school Vision 'All teachers and support staff work to provide a teaching pedagogy reflective of 21st Century designs focused on rich environments and personalised learning for all students'. Pivotal to this is the use of technology to enhance learning opportunities and experiences for our students. In Years 3 – 6, we have a 1:1 IPad program that requires our Years 3 – 6 students to being their IPad device to school every day. Under teacher instruction and supervision, these devices are used to ensure that students are able to maximise their learning outcomes which reflects a 21st Century skill set. Please note: One of the expectations of the ICT agreement is that students must have their iPads in their bags both to and from school. This includes having their IPad in their bag when waiting for a family member to pick them up at the end of the school day.

Prep – Year 2

JOLLY PHONICS PROFESSIONAL LEARNING

At Harvest Home Primary School, our teachers are always striving to show KAIZEN. During March, teachers from Prep, Year One and Year Two participated in Jolly Phonics Professional Learning. Jacqui Tarquinio (Jolly Phonics Trainer) facilitated the day. Jolly Phonics is an evidence based synthetic phonics program which uses a multisensory approach to teach students how to read and write.

What is Synthetic Phonics?

Synthetic phonics is a method of teaching where words are broken up into the smallest units of sound (phonemes). Children learn to make connections between the letters of written texts (graphemes, or letter symbols) and the sounds of spoken language. *The elements of Jolly Phonics are learning* the letter sounds, learning letter formation, blending, identifying sounds in words and 'tricky words'.



What can I do at home to support this learning?

All HHPS students have access to the Reading Eggs App. This App supports the synthetic approach to phonics with activities involving blending, matching letter sounds and identifying sounds in words.

The Jolly Phonics App is available to purchase on iTunes and Google Play and is highly recommended for use at home.

Our HHPS Community Teachers are excited to share all they learnt on the day with their students.

Educational Leaders Report

Year 3 – Year 6

THE PROGRESSION OF NUMERACY CONCEPTS

The Numeracy Learning Progressions outline a sequence of observable indicators of increasingly sophisticated understanding and skills in key numeracy concepts. They provide all teachers with a comprehensive view of numeracy learning within these key concepts.

At HHPS, Term 1 typically starts with the revision of and extension of 'place value' concepts taught the year before. Our HHPS assessment schedule is not only rigorous, but also purposeful as it helps us to understand where all students are situated on the learning continuum of the Victorian Curriculum.





As well know, students' progress at a variety of different rates and one of our tasks as 21st Century educators is to ensure all students are given the opportunity to learn a numeracy concept, such as Place Value, at their own specific 'entry point'.

Across Years 3-6 the progression of learning, within the Maths 'sub strand' of Place Value is outlined as follows;

TARGETED TEACHER GROUPS


Our teachers have been working collaboratively to analyse and interpret student data and design a learning pathway that will enable all students to experience learning growth in this particular area of Numeracy. Part of this process is the strategic planning of allocating students to a weekly 'focused teacher group' in which students are privileged the time of small group teacher guidance to target a particular area of focus. During this time, teachers use the data collected through various assessments to address any misunderstandings and provide new learning for students. This ensures we are giving our students every opportunity to demonstrate learning growth through a deeper level of understanding and application. Digital Learning / STEAM


CHALLENGED BASED LEARNING (CBL)

Challenge Based Learning (CBL) provides an efficient and effective framework for learning while solving real-world challenges. The framework is collaborative and hands-on, asking all participants (students, teachers, families, and community members) to identify 'Big Ideas', ask good and essential questions, discover and solve challenges linked to the Victorian Curriculum. During this process, the learners gain in-depth knowledge, develop 21st-century skills, and share their thoughts with the local and global community.

The Challenge Based Learning framework emerged from the 'Apple Classrooms of Tomorrow—Today' documentation, Apple worked with teachers and leaders in the education community to develop an approach to teaching and learning. It is an engaging, multidisciplinary approach that starts with the content and lets students leverage the technology that they use in their daily lives to tackle and solve complex and real-world problems in today's world.

Challenge Based Learning process is divided into three interconnected phases: Engage, Investigate, and Act. Each phase includes activities that prepare the learners to move to the next stage and supporting the entire framework is an ongoing process of documenting, reflecting and sharing.





Digital Learning / STEAM

During next term, the students of Harvest Home Primary School will be investigating the 'Big Idea- Community' linked to the Intercultural Capability (Prep- Years 4) and Economics and Business (Years 5-6) in the Victorian Curriculum. The aim for the students is to develop knowledge, understanding and skills linked to:

Prep, Year 1, Year 2, Year 3 & Year 4

- Demonstrating an awareness of and respect for culture diversity within the community
- Reflection on how intercultural experiences influence attitudes, values and beliefs
- Recognise the importance of acceptance and appreciation of culture diversity for a cohesive community.

Years 5 & 6

- Enterprising behaviours and capabilities that are transferable into life, work and business opportunities and contribute to the development and prosperity of individuals and society
- Understanding of the ways society allocates limited resources to satisfy needs and wants, and how they participate in the economy as consumers and producers.

Could all families please ask your child/ren about the topic of 'Community' and be part of the exciting things happening in their learning communities throughout the term at each stage of the Challenge Based Learning framework.



ONLINE PROGRAMS

As part of the Book Pack, students have access to some wonderful online programs to support learning. The programs are utilised in school and are a part of our Home Learning Expectations. Logins can be found in the inside of the Home Reading Journal/School Diary.



Wushka is a cloud-based levelled reading program used at school and would love you to continue reading with your child at home. The program encourages students to engage with fiction and non-fiction texts on interactive devices. All School Readers are levelled from Level 1 through to Level 31+ and have been developed using decades of educational publishing experience. Recognising that the best outcomes are achieved when students continue reading at home, your child can use their login details received at school, to complete readers set by their classroom teacher, at home. Your child is using **Mathletics** as part of their mathematics program at school. Mathletics is a targeted, rewarding and captivating online learning resource, which is aligned to curriculum standards. Your child has take-home access to Mathletics – they simply sign in with their school username and password using any compatible computer or mobile device. The extra Mathletics practice at home can make all the difference to your child's progress. Encourage them to achieve a weekly target of 1000 points to earn a certificate, building through bronze, silver and gold across the school year. Go for gold! www.mathletics.com



Your child is using **Spellodrome** as part of their literacy program at school. Spellodrome is a literacy resource that provides detailed instruction in spelling and support for vocabulary development. Your child has take-home access to Spellodrome – they simply sign in with their school username and password using any compatible computer or mobile device (same login as Mathletics). The extra Spellodrome practice at home can make all the difference to your child's progress. Encourage them to achieve a weekly target of 1000 points to earn certificates and awards. P*Spellodrome and Mathletics use the same usernames and passwords**



ABC Reading Eggs is designed to get your child motivated and excited about reading. Your child will now be able to access the program in class and at home. They will work through the program at their own pace, focusing on phonics, letters, vocabulary, sight words, fluency and comprehension.

Reading Eggspress is designed to build on reading and comprehension skills, and is usually for students in grades 2 onwards (7–13 year olds). There is also a built in library, where once again students can access a wide range of ebooks.

HHPS House Keeping

SCHOOL TIMES
