
Reading

This term, students have been continuing to work on various aspects of reading, such as:

- exploring different genres of texts and their features
- identifying text features and explaining the purpose of different text types, e.g. author's purpose
- developing a range of comprehension skills, such as summarising, inferencing, synthesising and analysing texts
- building independent reading stamina
- identifying different OWL words and phonics sounds in words being read




















Writing

This term we are focusing on writing procedural texts. We will be writing the steps that provide instructions on how to do or make something.

Students are also exploring a variety of other text types and engaging in authentic writing experiences. Students will be following the writing process of planning, drafting, editing and publishing their work. Within their groups, students will be continuing to work on the following skills:

- using consistent boundary punctuation such as capital letters and full stops
- adding detail to their writing using adjectives and adverbs
- rereading and editing their work for grammar and spelling
- using the dotted thirds to help with letter formation







Phonics / Spelling

Each week students have sessions dedicated to Phonics and Spelling based on the needs of the students. Within the Phonics sessions students develop their phonological and phonemic awareness. Jolly Phonics is used within the communities to identify, segment and blend sounds.








Numeracy


This term we are continuing to focus on students' problem solving and reasoning skills across a wide range of Numeracy topics.

These include:


- Addition and Subtraction revision of strategies such as count on, count back, doubles, friends of ten
- 2D shape identifying and describing the features of 2D shapes
- 3D shape identifying and describing the features of 3D shapes
- Place Value needs-based revision of place value concepts such as tens and ones, locating numbers on a number line
- Fractions identifying different representations of one half
- Mass comparing the mass of objects by using words such as heavier, lighter, same
- Division sharing into equal groups

Students' number fluency will continue to be supported through their individual Counting Goals.













Personal and Social Learning

In terms 3 and 4, students in Years 1 and 2 have been exploring the Bravehearts program though Personal & Social lessons. The Bravehearts Education Program is a personal safety education program for children ages 5-8. Their mission is to provide a coordinated and holistic approach to the prevention of child sexual abuse. All lessons consider age-appropriate content and language.

Teaching children personal safety strategies can help them build confidence, resilience and help keep them safe.

The 3 rules of personal safety:

- 1.We all have the right to feel safe with people.
- This rule teaches children and young people that they have the right to feel safe and secure where they live, play, and learn, and that no one has the right to make them do something that makes them feel unsafe or unsure.
- 2. It's OK to say 'NO' if you feel unsafe or unsure.
- This rule teaches children and young people that it is OK to stand up for themselves and to be assertive if something doesn't feel right.
- 3. Nothing is so yucky that you can't tell someone about it.
- One of the reasons that children and young people fail to disclose harm is because they are afraid of getting into trouble. This rule helps to encourage them to speak to a trusted adult, even if something seems scary or terrible.

This term, the focus for Bravehearts has been supporting students with what to do if they have a secret. Students develop an understanding of who the trusted adults may be in their lives and how to tell through songs, role plays and discussions.

Later this term, Years 1 and 2 will explore Topic 8 of the Resilience, Rights and Respectful Relationships learning resource. The main themes explored in Topic 8 – Positive Gender Relations are:

- What is fair / unfair play? Why do games work well when they are played fairly?
- •Being inclusive and gender friendly boys / girls should not be excluded from particular games due to their gender
- What does unsafe behaviour look like?
- The opposite of unsafe is respectful behaviour. How does it feel when people play respectfully?

This unit is research based and developed by experts in education and wellbeing, aligned with the Victorian Curriculum. All lessons consider age-appropriate content and language. You can find out more by following this link: https://www.vic.gov.au/respectful-relationships

Tutor Learning Initiative

We have also had some 'fun with phonics' by integrating movement with learning OWL words and letter sounds.









Year 1 Home Learning

In Year 1, Home Learning will continue to consist of Take Home reading, Tricky OWL word lists for students to practise reading and a number chart for students to practise their counting goal.

It is recommended that students in Year 1 participate in a minimum of 20 minutes of home learning per day with a family member. Students are to read either their take home book or a book on Reading Eggs or Sunshine Online on a daily basis. Please record the book read each night in their yellow home reader book. After reading, parents are encouraged to discuss the meaning of the books and give your child a deeper, richer understanding of what has been read.






