WRITING

In Writing this term, our Yiaga learners have been focusing on building our Writing stamina and creating narrative writing pieces. We have been busy using our imagination to generate creative ideas, whilst following and understanding our five step writing process:

- Pre-writing/planning
- Drafting
- Revising
- Editing
- Publishing.



Our Yiaga learners have had an amazing start to writing with many humorous and suspenseful pieces being created. As we continue working through the term, learners will be given the opportunity to publish and present their writing both written and orally. We are looking forward to seeing many completed written pieces throughout the term.





MERCHALL BACY

We have made an exciting start to numeracy this year. We began the year by unpacking 'what makes a good mathematician' and discussing how we learnt best in Yiaga.

Learners have begun to explore place value with a focus on recognising and reading 4 and 5 digit numbers. When discussing numeracy at home, ask your children how many ones, tens, hundreds, thousands, and tens of thousands are in a number? These skills are imperative for learners to use in all numeracy units throughout the year such as addition, subtraction, multiplication and division. Learners will be working to place numbers on number lines, order numbers and use their mathematical knowledge to justify their choices.

We move into Geometry - Shape later this term. In this unit we will focus on identifying and describing 2D and 3D shapes. Learners will explore shape properties and features. When you're out and about, ask your children to identify 2D and 3D shapes around them. Some important key words to discuss with them are:

Vertices

Sides

Faces

Angles
2D and 3D shape names

Remember to practice these skills on Mathletics throughout the

term

Home Learning expectations

In year 4, it is recommended that learners read for at least 30 minutes per day.

Learners will be given the opportunity to borrow a take home book each Monday, swap it for a new book on Wednesday, and return their book on Friday. Learners should read their take home book (or another Just Right text) each day and record the book they read, how long they read for and how many pages they read in their orange diary.

When appropriate, your child's teachers may send home worksheets for your child to practise or consolidate skills we have been working on at school.

Yiaga learners can also practise a range of skills on a number of online platforms which they have access to. The reading apps will be particularly useful on weekends when students do not have access to a take home book. The apps are:

- Sunshine Online
- Reading EggsMathletics
- Readiwriter

Learner passwords will be available in their diaries.

Reminders

HHPS has a Bring Your Own Device program for learners in years 3-6. Yiaga learners need to bring their device to school every day, fully charged and in its protective case. Learners will be responsible for looking after their own device during the school day.

Every morning, learners at HHPS have a short fruit break between 10-10.30am to support their brain function throughout the morning. Please make sure your child has a piece of fruit (or vegetable) to snack on at this time each morning, as well as their lunch and snack for later in the day.

HHPS is a Sun Smart school. During Term 1, all learners are required to wear a school hat when outside at recess, lunch and for community activities. Please ensure that your child packs their school hat each day.

Hello Killara families,

It has been a wonderful start to the to the year. All students have settled in extremely well and we are excited for the teaching and learning that is to come.

We have commenced the year by reviewing our school wide positive behaviours and have been revising our practices and principles.

Students have also been learning about our learner dispositions which will enable them to really think and reflect on their learning, continuously grow, and achieve their goals.



Reading

Reading in Term 1 is a very exciting time. It is where the students set the tone for the year and gain an understanding of what expectations are for Year 4. We started off the Term by focusing on our Community, Reading group and Library expectations. We then revisited choosing a Just Right Book. Using their Just Right book, the students then began developing and increasing their Reading stamina.

Together we explored our Reading Workshop Model and discussed what a Reading session will look like. Using this model, the students have now begun building their Reading strategies to help with goal setting.

Throughout the Term we will focus on the following:

- Summarising
- Inferring events and characters within a fiction text
- Identifying strategies the author uses within a text to keep us engaged.

Writing

The Year 4's have hit the ground running in Writing for Term 1! We began the Term with discussing the standards we expect for students during a Writing session and refreshed the students on how we can show 'Pride of Place' in our workbooks. We got straight into writing a narrative story, inspired by the students' favourite memory. We have continued to focus on ideas for a Narrative, using different tools and resources to promote ideas, e.g. the 5 senses, picture prompts and many more. During the Writing process, we will also be looking at:

- Editing and Revising
- Publishing
- Spelling and Grammar

There are many Narrative stories to come, and we are excited to see the students incredible Writing pieces.

We will also be working towards obtaining a Pen License this year, students are aware of all the criteria they need, to be awarded with a license and are looking forward to showing their best Writing.















Numeracy

Numeracy in Term 1 has been super exciting already! After setting up our classroom routines and establishing what a good mathematician does, students have begun exploring Place Value. During this unit of learning, we will be focusing on reading, writing, and recognising a variety of numbers such as 56, 273. Learning these skills will be very beneficial when we move to other Number topics later in the year like Addition, Subtraction, Multiplication, and Division.

Throughout the rest of the Term, we will be focusing on:

Measurement & Geometry

- Recognising & naming the features of 3D shapes
- Comparing the areas of regular and irregular shapes.

Number & Algebra

- Counting patterns that include number sequences such as, 3, 4, 7, 8 & 9
- Equivalent number sentences to find unknown quantities involving Addition and Subtraction.



Challenge Based Learning



As an introduction to our 'Online Safety' topic this Term, students participated in a virtual incursion about Cyber Safety. Students will also participate in weekly lessons where they will be exploring how to be safe online both at home and at school. They will also learn about ways that they can communicate respectfully through the different educational apps and programs. Students will be participating in weekly tasks that involve them practising these skills through role plays, group work and individual tasks, where they will be able to share ideas and learn alongside each other.













This week, all students were provided with daily opportunities to bring home a take home reader, following the school 'Show and Swap' process. Students are expected to read daily, for the recommended time of 30 minutes. Listening to your child read aloud is a valuable experience for families and your child as students can continue to celebrate their reading progress with you. After reading, you may like to ask your child a series of questions about the text, this ensures they understand what they read.

Once your child has read their book, it must be recorded in their orange student diary. Just a friendly reminder, all students at HHPS are required to have a reading satchel to borrow a book.

This year you may notice a difference in the books that your child is bringing home. The texts sent home are based on your child's Independent Reading level, which means they should be able to read, discuss and comprehend the content within the text without much assistance.
