Reading


Students will continue working in their groups on their shared and personal reading goals. Student groups may change throughout the term depending on assessment results and the learning needs of your child.

Our focus this term is <u>summarising</u>. Summarising retells the main events of a text in a shorter version. Students will learn to use summarising tools such as "Beginning, Problem and Solution" for a fiction text and "Main Idea, Fact, Fact, Fact" for a non-fiction text.


Your child may also be working on one or more of the following skills in their reading group:

- Using Fix-It Strategies, such as stretching the sounds in words or 'chunking' familiar parts in words.
- Rereading a sentence when they have made an error or their reading does not make sense
- Asking questions about a text before, during and after reading
- Reading with fluency and expression
- Finding evidence in the text to assist with answering questions
- Giving a summary of the most important events in a text


Student work is displayed around our community to celebrate our learning in Reading.











Writing

Our writing genre this term is Narratives. The purpose of a Narrative is to entertain in great detail. Examples of a Narrative texts are *Jack and the beanstalk, The Three Little Pigs and Little Red Riding Hood.*

Students will learn to identify the purpose and structure of Narrative. Students will write various Narratives, focusing on correct structure and sequence. Students will develop a character and describe physical and personal traits of characters. They will develop a setting and describe the setting in the story. Students will begin their stories with an engaging introduction, then create a problem and solution for their story.

This Narrative writing will guide students through the different stages of the writing process (planning, composing, editing, and publishing).

Within their Writing groups, students may be focusing on the following skills:

- Punctuation and Grammar
- Vocabulary and sentence structure
- Sound knowledge and spellingUsing interesting words, such as adjectives and adverbs







Students have been creating and developing

Numeracy

Students have been given individual counting goals which they have been working on during number fluency. Students are assessed to see whether they have achieved these goal and can move to the next goal. The counting skills involve counting forwards and backwards by 1 to 100 and beyond and skip counting forwards and backwards by 2, 3, 5 and 10 from 0 as well as various starting points other than 0. Students will be regularly assessed according to their knowledge in the related topics taught.

- Addition and Subtraction Students will explore various addition and subtraction strategies including counting on, counting back and mental strategies. Students will also explore the relationship between addition and subtraction through hands on partitioning activities.
- Fractions Students will learn how to recognise and describe one half as 1 of 2 equal parts of a whole.
- Time Students will learn to tell time to the half-hour, using the language of 'past' and 'to' on an analogue and digital clock. Additionally, students will use a calendar daily to identify the date and determine the number of days in each month.
- Money Students will learn to recognise, describe and order Australian coins according to their value. Additionally, students will count and order small collections of coins and notes.

Back to Front Maths Program - Sessions aimed at correcting misconceptions around quantity, partitioning and number knowledge.










The students in the Durrong community are learning about fractions and the term 'half'.



Reading:

Students will continue working in their groups on their shared and personal reading goals. Student groups may change throughout the term depending on assessment results and the learning needs of your child.

Our reading focus for this term is **<u>summarising</u>**. Summarising retells the main events of a text in a shorter version. Students will learn to use summarising tools such as

"Somebody, Wanted, But, So, Then" for a fiction text and "Main Idea, Fact, Fact, Fact" for a non-fiction text.

Your child may also be working on one or more of the following skills in their reading group:

- Using Fix-It Strategies, such as stretching the sounds in words or 'chunking' familiar parts in words
- Rereading a sentence when they have made an error or their reading does not make sense
- Asking questions about a text before, during and after reading
- Continuing to build reading stamina during Independent Reading
- Reading with fluency and expression
- Making predictions and inferences using clues from the text
- Finding evidence in the text to assist with answering questions
- Giving a summary of the most important events or details in a text in their own words

Writing:



Numeracy:

Students have been given individual counting goals which they have been working on during number fluency. Students are assessed to see whether they have achieved these goal and can move to the next goal. The counting skills involve counting forwards and backwards by 1 to 100 and beyond and skip counting forwards and backwards by 2, 3, 5 and 10 from 0 as well as various starting points other than 0. Students will be regularly assessed according to their knowledge in the related topics taught.



Addition and Subtraction – Students will explore various addition and subtraction strategies including counting on, counting back and mental strategies. Students will also explore the relationship between addition and subtraction through hands on partitioning activities.

Fractions – Students will learn how to recognise and describe one half as 1 of 2 equal parts of a whole.

Time – Students will learn to tell time to the half-hour, using the language of 'past' and 'to' on an analogue and digital clock. Additionally, students will use a calendar daily to identify the date and determine the number of days in each month.

Money – Students will learn to recognise, describe and order Australian coins according to their value. Additionally, students will count and order small collections of coins and notes.

Back to Front Maths – Sessions aimed at correcting misconceptions around quantity, partitioning and number knowledge.

S.W.P.B:








PERSONALISED HOME LEARNING TASKS:
