LEARNING COMMUNITIES

We are very excited to welcome back all our existing and new families to HHPS. This year we have seen our school continue to grow with lots of new faces in our Communities; both teachers and students.

We now have seven Learning Communities, which are:

- Kirrip Prep
- Durrong & Wurun Year 1
- Tamboore Year 2
- Galada- Year 3
- Balam Year 4
- Dulap Year 5
- Matong Year 6

This year we have a slightly different structure as we have moved from composite Communities, to what is commonly referred to as 'straight' Communities. Whilst the education research around the ideal structuring of classes is inconclusive, we know that our Learning Community approach is able to grow the 'whole child', which includes developing their '21st Century' skills. Skills such as collaboration, critical thinking, problem solving, decision making, creativity, innovation, communication, self-management and social responsibility. These are all essential skills which complement our relentless focus on building each students Literacy and Numeracy skills. Our teachers are able to target the learning needs of every child, regardless on what class type they are in.

SPANISH AT HHPS

As part of the learning entitlements of the Victorian Curriculum it is expected that all students have the opportunity to learn a language in every Victorian government schools. As a result of our community survey conducted in 2018, Spanish was the language of choice, so we are very excited to say that our Spanish program has officially commenced.

Spanish will be taught for one Semester in Years F-2, whilst our Year 3 to 6 students will have Spanish for both Semesters – that is, the whole year. We hope that this will support these older students to continue Spanish into their secondary years of schooling. We are very pleased that Edgars Creek Secondary College is also teaching Spanish, so it really creates a fantastic opportunity for our students to have a Language pathway.

PROGRESSIVE REPORTING IN 2019

HHPS is committed to providing parents with the most up to date, accurate and informative methodology of sharing the progress of your child's learning. The Victorian Curriculum is structured as a single developmental learning continuum and is organised by levels not years of schooling, so it is important that both learning growth is celebrated along with outright performance. Our Progressive Reports are a continuous assessment of what the student is working towards during lessons.

Last year, the structure of our Progressive Report focussed on 'Goals and Achievements'. Once a goal was achieved in was moved into the Achievements box. This year, the Curriculum team have made some adjustments to this process which will further support the differentiated learning pace of our students. On Progressive Reports in 2019, teachers will have the flexibility for goals to be either 'continued' and/or 'revised' in order to provide the child with the greatest opportunity to achieve that goal. If the teacher deems a goal to be unattainable, then the teacher will be able to change the learning goal to a new goal. If this is the case, the teacher will make contact with families to discuss the new goal and how the child can be supported to achieve it.

Remember that at any stage of the year you can access your child's Progressive Report to see their current goals and a summary of some of their achievements to date. Compass reminders will again occur at Weeks 3,6 and 9 of each Term, with the exception of Term 1, where the first Progressive Report notification will occur at the end of Week 6.

LITERACY

Every teacher's aim is to help children to become lifelong readers. Our teachers have been working hard to analyse data to help plan for guided reading groups and prepare for the start of our Reading

program. A highly supportive physical environment is essential and at HHPS, and therefore every Community has a classroom library. The classroom library reinforces to students about what we value in our learning at HHPS. The classroom library is crucial in helping students develop who they are as readers, as well as providing a sense of ownership over their reading. As teachers, we need to be intentional and purposeful in how we set up our libraries so that the passion and skill of every reader is considered. These libraries help our students to learn how to build strong reading habits.




Our classroom libraries provide:

NUMERACY

It is important to develop a healthy class culture in Numeracy where students feel comfortable to try new strategies, take risks when problem solving and build resilience when faced with challenging tasks. This has been the focus for our students this week. Developing a growth mindset is vital to ensure we give our students the best opportunity to succeed in Numeracy.



At HHPS all of our teachers have been working diligently to ensure students have started school in a safe and supportive learning environment with high expectations. PROFESSIONAL LEARNING AT HHPS

On Monday and Tuesday HHPS hosted the Victorian P-6 Maths
Improvement Project. We had 35 teachers from around Victoria

sessions was to ensure the development of important mathematical concepts, including place value, relative size and

Dear Families,

Our focus on Cyber Safety, in conjunction with School Wide Positive Behaviour, will be one of our main objectives in Term 1 at Harvest Home Primary School. The teachers will be conducting lessons over the term, based on the concept of online safety in Foundation- Year 6 communities. This will ensure our digital environment aligns to the school settings and objectives.

You may be aware of the 'Bring Your Own Device' iPad program for our Year 3-6 Students has commenced for 2019. Please note that if your child/ren have completed and handed in the appropriate paperwork, they can bring their devices to school, fully charged, ready for learning.

We will be also re-introducing our lunch time clubs dubbed STEAM and Coding in 2019. This will commence later in the term. The clubs will focus on students being collaborative, creative and critical thinkers with activities featuring 3D printing, coding, robotics and sustainability.

Students will be continuing to concentrate on sustainability in our Specialist Science classes and developing our radio station in our Media Arts program. Finally, we will be exploring sports science in Physical Education and creating beautiful digital artwork in our Visual Arts program in the coming terms.

ONLINE PROGRAMS

As part of the Book Pack, students have access to some wonderful online programs to enhance their learning. The programs are utilised in school and are a part of the HHPS Home Learning Expectations. Logins can be found in the inside of the Home Reading Journal/School Diary. <u>Please note: all of our online programs will be fully available and functional from Week 5 of this term. We are just in the finalising all the student subscriptions details and logins.</u>

Wushka is a cloud-based levelled reading program used at school and would love you to continue reading with your child at home. The program encourages students to engage with fiction and non-fiction texts on interactive devices. All School Readers are levelled from Level 1 through to Level 31+ and have been developed using decades of educational publishing experience. Recognising that the best outcomes are achieved when students continue reading at home, your child can use their login details received at school, to complete readers set by their classroom teacher, at home. Visit wushka.com.au to login and start reading!

Mathletics

Your child is using Mathletics as part of their mathematics program at school. Mathletics is a targeted, rewarding and captivating online learning resource, which is aligned to curriculum standards. Your child has take-home access to Mathletics – h their school username and password using any compatible computer or mobile

they simply sign in with their school username and password using any compatible computer or mobile device. The extra Mathletics practice at home can make all the difference to your child's progress. Encourage them to achieve a weekly target of 1000 points to earn a certificate, building through bronze, silver and gold across the school year. Go for gold! www.mathletics.com

Spellodrome

Your child is using Spellodrome as part of their literacy program at school. Spellodrome is a literacy resource that provides detailed instruction in

spelling and support for vocabulary development. Your child has take-home access to Spellodrome – they simply sign in with their school username and password using any compatible computer or mobile device (same login as Mathletics). The extra Spellodrome practice at home can make all the difference to your child's progress. Encourage them to achieve a weekly target of 1000 points to earn certificates and awards.



ABC Reading Eggs is designed to get your child motivated and excited about reading. Your child will now be able to access the program in class and at home. They will work through the program at their own pace, focusing on phonics, letters, vocabulary, sight words, fluency and comprehension.

Reading Eggspress is designed to build on reading and comprehension skills, and is usually for students in grades 2 onwards (7–13 year olds). There is also a built in library, where once again students can access a wide range of ebooks.
