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Dear Harvest Home Primary School Community,

Collective responsibility is term that is frequently used in Victorian Education lately. It is a pillar that we at Harvest Home Primary school use and have embedded into the daily practice for our students. Our students refer to their 'classroom' as a 'community' and identify their 'teacher' as 'teachers' The Victorian Government have committed to building new schools in Melbourne's growth corridors in the year 2020 and 2021. Although we do not have a say in the timing of these schools, we are having a significant impact into the pedagogical models that they are wishing to embed. We are developing a very strong reputation for the way that our students and teachers learn in our spaces.

Towards the end of March, I was contacted by our Senior Education Improvement Leader (SEIL) to ask if we would be able to be a School Improvement Partner lead school with another school to help build their teachers capacity with teaching in flexible learning spaces prior to them moving into their new school. What a wonderful achievement for a school that is only just two and a term years old to be a lead school and one that other schools look up to. Last Monday (6th May) we had four teachers and one school leader from a school come out and spend the day observing our teachers and students working in our spaces. Emily was part of this learning walk and articulated what our planning looks like, how we have implemented our school wide positive behaviour framework and discussed 'our identity' and 'what we stand for'. The staff from the other school could not believe what we have achieved in such a short period of time. Another key component of the learning walk was how our community have embraced the 'Harvest Home Way' of teaching and learning. The feedback that we have received is extremely pleasing and makes me very proud to be the Principal of our school. As part of the School Improvement Partner initiative another visit will take place on Monday 20th May, when we will have another six teachers from the same school come out for a learning walk again and I am sure they will be just as impressed as the first group. Thank you for your continued support this term.

----Curriculum Report----

Reading & the Premiers' Reading Challenge

Harvest Home Primary school has a significant focus of developing the reading skills of all students. Recent studies on Literacy confirm what educators have known for years; the more contact children have with books, the better readers they become. Our Community Teachers promote improving Reading learning outcomes by reading to our students daily, having all students interact with books through 'Guided Reading' sessions, accessing books from our Community libraries and building up reading 'stamina' through independent reading time.

All students from Yrs. 1-6 have been registered to participate in the Premiers Reading Challenge. As of this week, we have a total of **626 books** that are currently being read and another **915 books** that have already been finished; which equates to a total amount of **1541 bo**oks that our students have engaged with because of the challenge. We also have ten students who have already completed the challenge! The challenge will remain active until Term 3, with it officially ending on 6th September, 2019. Whilst students must read a certain amount of books from the challenge list, all students are encouraged to enter and read as many 'free choice' books as they can. Take home readers may also be entered onto the online portal. The school has also purchased some additional books for our Community libraries from the challenge list, so we are currently looking at how we can implement and manage book-borrowing processes that will hopefully start later this term.

Online NAPLAN

Next week our Year 3 and 5 Community students will complete the National Assessment Program - Literacy and Numeracy (NAPLAN) tests. NAPLAN is made up of tests in four areas: Reading, Writing, Language Conventions (Spelling, Grammar & Punctuation) and Numeracy.

HHPS is one of many schools across the country that will be going 'online' for NAPLAN for the first time in 2019. Federal, State and Territory Education Ministers have agreed that all NAPLAN will move online over the next two to three years, so we are very pleased to that we are leading the way. The NAPLAN online test uses an adaptive design, which presents questions that better match student achievement levels and will consequently provide results that are more precise. All students in Years 3 and 5 have had an opportunity to go onto the online test practice platform to ensure they are comfortable and familiar with the question types and online formats.

The results of the tests provide information about student achievement, which can be used to help us to better plan our teaching and learning programs. Please note; it is very important that families understand that the NAPLAN tests provide point-in-time information regarding a child's progress in both Literacy and Numeracy. The tests are intended to supplement teacher judgments that are evidence-based curriculum scores, as well as the wide range of formal and informal assessments that we already use at HHPS. As with all single assessments, NAPLAN test results are not intended to be used in isolation from any other school-based assessment.

LANGUAGE EXPERIENCE & WRITING

"Tell me and I forget, teach me and I remember. Involve me and I learn" Benjamin Franklin

Using Language Experiences as an approach to improve student outcomes in Writing is something that is a regular practice in the early years of school at HHPS. A Language Experience begins with students participating in a shared experience. Through the shared experience, the teacher-led discussion provides students with the opportunity to hear and use new vocabulary and phrases associated to the specific experience. Examples of Language Experiences at HHPS include, 'a party', 'a day at the beach', 'visiting a farm', 'camping' and learning about 'insects'. This approach is very important for all students as it removes the variability of what previous life experiences that children present with at school. The students really enjoy these experiences and they have recently commenced with much excitement and engagement generated throughout our Learning Communities.

Whilst the approach is typically in Yrs. P-2, it is also extremely beneficial in Yrs. 3-6, as through



Language Experience, students are engaged in all modes of English; Reading, Writing and Speaking & Listening. Students participate in the experience, talk about it, complete a writing task and then read what has been written. It draws the shared experiences to enrich language through the development of vocabulary, knowledge of the structures of English, using language for different purposes and the extension of the students' world knowledge and understanding of concepts. One of the biggest benefits is that this allows the teachers to lead discussion and provides students with the opportunity to hear and use new vocabulary.

"When we go into the pod we learn about different things like animals. We read books, play with toy animals and learn new words and letters."


"I used new words that I wouldn't normally use for example 'disappointed', 'difficult' and 'participant,' instead of 'angry' or 'hard.'




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-- Digital Learning / STEAM --

Families of our Year 3-6 students are reminded to ensure that your child who is involved in our BYOD program have their devices fully charged and ready. This is pivotal to enable our teachers to continue to plan and develop the target skills within the Technologies curriculum. ONLINE PROGRAMS

As part of the Book Pack, students have access to some wonderful online programs to enhance their learning. The programs are utilised in school and are a part of the HHPS Home Learning Expectations. Logins can be found in the inside of the Home Reading Journal/School Diary.

Wushka is a cloud-based levelled reading program used at school and would love you to continue reading with your child at home. The program encourages students to engage with fiction and non-fiction texts on interactive devices. All School Readers are levelled from Level 1 through to Level 31+ and have been developed using decades of educational publishing experience. Recognising that the best outcomes are achieved when students continue reading at home, your child can use their login details received at school, to complete readers set by their classroom teacher, at home. Your child is using Mathletics as part of their mathematics program at school. Mathletics **Mathletics** is a targeted, rewarding and captivating online learning resource, which is aligned to curriculum standards. Your child has take-home access to Mathletics – they simply sign in with their school username and password using any compatible computer or mobile device. The extra Mathletics practice at home can make all the difference to your child's progress. Encourage them to achieve a weekly target of 1000 points to earn a certificate, building through bronze, silver and gold across the school year. Go for gold! www.mathletics.com

Spellodrome

Your child is using Spellodrome as part of their literacy program at school. Spellodrome is a literacy resource that provides detailed instruction in spelling and support for vocabulary development. Your child has take-home access to Spellodrome – they simply sign in with their school username and password using any compatible computer or mobile device (same login as Mathletics). The extra Spellodrome practice at home can make all the difference to your child's progress. Encourage them to achieve a weekly target of 1000 points to earn certificates and awards.

> ABC Reading Eggs is designed to get your child motivated and excited about reading. Your child will now be able to access the program in class and at home. They will work through the program at their own pace, focusing on phonics, letters, vocabulary, sight

words, fluency and comprehension.

Reading Eggspress is designed to build on reading and comprehension skills, and is usually for students in grades 2 onwards (7–13 year olds). There is also a built in library, where once again students can access a wide range of ebooks. HHPS School Values
