READING

Welcome back to term 4 reading! During this term we will be reading and analysing Fiction texts. Students will be explaining why a book is engaging, by analysing different author's craft techniques. We will also be learning to infer the message and theme of a text, as well as connecting this to our own lives.

Reading at home is one of the best ways to help your child progress with their reading. After your child has completed their reading, ask them some of the questions below:

Fiction texts:

- 1. What are the important parts of this story?
- 2. Does the main character change throughout the story? How so? What causes them to change?


Non-fiction texts:

- 1. What genre is this book? How do you know?
- 2. What are some Non-Fiction features you can find in the text?










Supporting Reading at Home:


- Log on to Reading Eggs and support your child to read online (passwords can be located in your child's diary).
- Please support your child by reading a book with them at home and logging it in their school diary.
- After reading with your child, discuss the book with them to assist in building their comprehension of the text.

WRITING










Students visited Werribee Zoo to inspire their information report writing. We kicked off the term by exploring the format of information reports, enabling students to craft engaging pieces about animals of their choice. They learned to structure their information into organised paragraphs with appropriate subheadings. Students researched their favorite animals from the zoo, incorporating descriptive language to enhance their reports. They also focused on writing captivating introductions to draw in their readers. Later this term, they will explore various types of poems and create their own poetry.





Supporting Writing at Home:

Encourage your child/ren to write a text of their choice at home.
E.g. What should we eat for dinner? (Persuasive), What I did on the weekend (Recount), How to make a silly sandwich (Procedural).

SPELLING & GRAMMAR

During our Spelling and Grammar sessions, students have been focused on crafting engaging sentences that start with words ending in '-ing.'

They learned to create complex sentences using subordinate conjunctions and gained an understanding of dependent and independent clauses.

Additionally, we have been learning the spellings and uses of different homophones.













NUMERACY


Our Term 4 Numeracy topics are:

- Angles
- Symmetry
- Data
- Chance
- Addition Patterns
- Subtraction Patterns
- Place Value



We began the term with our topics of Angles and Symmetry where students did lots of learning through exploration. Our most recent topic of data has allowed students to work both within a small group and independently to conduct data investigations. These investigations included students selecting a question for their investigation, collecting the data, presenting the data within a graph and then analysing their data. We are very excited for the rest of the term and know our students will make amazing growth.






Supporting Numeracy at Home:

- Students can practise their Counting Goals using their Hundreds/Time Table chart in their Home Learning Folder or the interactive chart online.
- Using Mathletics and My Numeracy (Essential Assessment), students can practise and revise topics we cover throughout the year.









INQUIRY -Indigenous Perspectives

This term, students will develop an understanding of what life was like for Australia's first people. We began with an excursion to Werribee Open Range zoo, where students learnt about Bunjil the Eagle.

Back at school they discovered Indigenous connections to Country, through exploring natural materials, tools, and astronomy. Coming up, students will investigate how life has changed, or remained the same, over time.



PERSONAL & SOCIAL

During term 4, students will be learning about Human Development. The topics include: Hygiene, Life cycles, Body awareness/safety, Choice/consent, Strategies for wellbeing, and where to go for Support (trusted adult, parent). These topics are taught as part of the Victorian Curriculum. Please contact your child's Homegroup teacher if you have any questions.

Each term, students participate in the 'Inform and Empower' online safety incursion. This term, Year Threes learnt about using the 'Settings' function to increase online safety.
