Our students have been developing an understanding of author's craft, analysing an author's language choices and how they choose to structure their texts.



Supporting Reading at Home:

- Students have been asked to read each night at home. Students can read their take home readers or they can log on to Sunshine Online or Reading Eggs.
 Please support your child with logging their reading in their school diary.
- After reading with your child, discuss the book with them to assist in building their comprehension of the text.









WRITING

This term in Writing, our focus is how to write persuasive texts. We are learning about how to structure a persuasive text by including an introduction, three reasons with evidence and a conclusion.

We are 'Being our Best' by using a range of different persuasive techniques, including:

- Rhetorical questions: Don't you wish you could read our persuasive writing?
- Emotive language: Our persuasive writing is extremely strong and incredibly powerful!
- Expert appeal: 9 out of 10 teachers surveyed say we are doing a fabulous job with our writing.
- Similes: Our persuasive texts are like your favourite book - you will never want to stop reading them.


NUMERACY



This term in Durrong, students will be focusing on addition and subtraction, money, odd and even numbers and length and capacity.

Similar to last term, students will complete another 'at home learning module' through Google Classroom.

The purpose of 'at home learning modules' is to prioritise time and space for deep understanding and learning of key numeracy concepts. Further details will be posted on Compass.

Supporting Numeracy at Home:

- Students can practise their Counting Goals using their Hundred's/Time Table chart in their Home Learning Folder or the interactive chart online.
- Using Mathletics and My Numeracy (Essential Assessment), students can practise and revise topics we cover throughout the year.




CHALLENGE BASED LEARNING

This term our CBL topic is History. Students will be exploring Australian History and how Australia has changed over time. Throughout their investigation, students will research some wonderings they have about Australian History, and think about key dates that shaped the country. They will investigate and describe different perspectives of people from the past, recognising different points of view. Students will then get to present a piece of our history to their peers.







This term, we have acknowledged the following significant days: ANZAC day and Mother's day. We have also been learning about being mindful, and how we can be self-aware and manage stress.

To assist your child in displaying the Harvest Home school values of 'Being your Best', 'Being Safe' and 'Being Respectful' in the wider Community, we encourage you to use and promote this language at home and participate in discussions about your child's day at school.

Some conversation starters you could use are:

- What was your favourite thing about school today?
- How did you practice mindfulness today?
- How did you show KAIZEN today?
- What made you really happy?
- What was something new or interesting you learnt today?
- What <u>Learner Disposition</u> did you use today? (Curious, Collaborate, Brave, Problem-Solve, Reflect, Self-Aware and Determined)














OTHER REMINDERS

HOME LEARNING

It is recommended that students in Year 3 participate in a minimum of 30 minutes of home learning per day. This is something that we are hoping students will work towards as they continue to build their reading stamina at home and at school. Students are expected to read their take home book on a daily basis (or a Just Right Book agreed upon with their teacher) and return it Wednesday and Fridays in their HHPS Reading Satchel. On Friday students will not take home a book, but instead they will be encouraged to participate in 'Sunshine Online Weekend'. This is an opportunity for students to complete their reading on their device. Please record the book read each night in their diary. After reading, families are encouraged to discuss the meaning of the text with their child to develop a deeper, richer understanding of what has been read.
