Principal's Report

Congratulations to our Harvest Home community on a very successful semester. Our students have focussed on their Kaizen, looking to display "a little bit of improvement" with every opportunity. It is amazing how quickly the year is progressing, with students' learning development evident within every learning community, specialist session, and within our school community.

I am so very proud of our students, teachers and leaders, with a clear focus on positive learning and engagement outcomes. Teachers have connected with all students within the learning community, with learning groups occurring and teachers and students transitioning to different learning spaces within the learning community to ensure our flexible yet student-personalised learning environments.

Student Voice:

Recently, our students in Years 4, 5 and 6 had the opportunity to complete an individual survey providing feedback to the school based on their learning, wellbeing, engagement and school connections. This annual survey offered by the Department of Education enables schools to gain an insight and understanding of our students' recent perceptions and experiences of Harvest Home Primary School. The survey enables our promotion and value of student's voice, providing an opportunity to build on our student engagement, well-being and student-centred and personalised learning opportunities. In Term 3, we will be able to access the data presented in groups of students rather than individual students. We look forward to receiving the data and building on the very positive data from 2023.

Staffing Updates

- -Congratulations to Maria Ivanciu (Year 6), who has begun her family leave. Christina Ramanatis and Sarah Kennedy, currently staff members at our school, will replace Maria throughout the second semester.

Alannah will teach 3 days a week (Mon, Tue, Wed), with Elisa Hassini on the other 2 days (Th & F)
- Congratulations to **Kyle Hattie (Year 5)**, who has successfully applied to become a learning specialist at another primary school. Kyle has been an experienced member of our school community, positively impacting our senior school students. Kyle has also been pivotal in implementing our Learner Dispositions and supporting the launch of our Inquiry curriculum. Kyle will begin his new role at the beginning of Term 3. **Sheena Collins Marks will return from family leave** and join the Year 5 Learning Community. Sheena will teach three days a week, teamed with Stephanie Schieven.

Teeth on Wheels

As communicated via Compass, we have partnered with Teeth on Wheels, a mobile dental service that supports eligible students in accessing a dentist visit while attending school.

The Teeth On Wheels team will be **visiting our school during Term 3.** By providing this service, we aim to reduce the hassle of booking dental appointments, taking time off work and interrupting the already busy days.

All students have received an application form, which families are welcome to complete and return to school by Wednesday, 26th June **2024.** (time frame extended from previous due date)

If your child/ren is eligible under the Child Dental Benefits Schedule (CDBS), treatments can be completed for free, based on the benefit scheme. If your child/ren is not eligible, Teeth on Wheels can offer a special deal for the dental service, which is only available via our school visit. Assistant Principal's Report

Academic Reports


Academic reports will be posted on Compass for families to view on Thursday 27th June. When reading your child's report please pay particular attention to the information on the second page of the report document.

This information will explain your child's:

- Level of Achievement against either the Victorian Curriculum or EAL continuum
- Performance regarding 'Being Respectful', 'Being Safe' and 'Being Your Best'.
- Attendance and any potential impacts on their learning
- DNP Codes (Did Not Participate) these are Department of Education codes that explain a special circumstance as to why a curriculum score has not be allocated

In the Academic Report, students are assigned progression points against each of the Victorian Curriculum learning areas taught during the Semester.

When a student is working 6 months below their expected level, they are still considered to be 'at level' as they are steadily working towards the standard. At times students can be plotted above standard, meaning that they are working on more difficult concepts at the next level of the Victorian Curriculum. Students can grow at different stages and at different rates and we can sometimes see a student sustained' at a particular level. Often students need time to consolidate their learning when they are working above the expected level therefore although continuing to grow, this may not be reflected in their progression point and is not a cause for concern.



It is also important to note that when implementing our HHPS Specialist program, the timetabling of lessons for each Semester attempts to enable all student to access as much of the Victorian Curriculum's learning entitlements as possible, however teaching staff and timetabling logistics can impact on this and therefore in some year levels, students only have certain subject availability in each semester.

Progressive Reports

By the end of the term, you will also find your child's progressive report updated to reflect some of the achievements that they have accomplished this Semester in each of the key learning areas. A new addition this year is the inclusion of a student reflection.

Please take the time to read over these in addition to the Academic report, and celebrate the wonderful learning that your child has achieved in the first 6 months of this year.

At the beginning of next term, the Semester 2 progressive report will be shared with you, outlining your child's Term 3 goals. Remember progressive goals can be accessed at any time for you to see what your child's termly goals are.

Inquiry at HHPS

Spotlight on STEAM Engagement Club

This provided students with the opportunity to use materials to design and create bridges, spinners, paper planes, marble runs, towers and catapults. Students were also able to learn more about STEAM by exploring VR Headsets and a STEAM Kahoot using iPads.

It also includes inquiry-based experiences, and using technologies to investigate and to solve problems. At home, you may encourage and support activities that are STEAM related by:

- Singing songs and nursery rhymes
- Playing with building blocks
- Using a device to create a video with special effects
- Cooking



School Wide Positive Behaviour Support

In addition to my teaching degree, I also have a degree in Environmental Science. I love all things animals, the environment and sustainability.


Reconciliation Week

Online Programs

As part of the Book Pack, students have access to some wonderful online programs to support learning. The programs are utilised in school and are a part of our Home Learning Expectations. Logins can be found in the inside of the Home Reading Journal/School Diary.



Wushka (in 2023 this is for Prep students only) is a cloud-based levelled reading program used at school and would love you to continue reading with your child at home. The program encourages students to engage with fiction and non-fiction texts on interactive devices. All School Readers are levelled from Level 1 through to Level 31+ and have been developed using decades of educational publishing experience. Recognising that the best outcomes are achieved when students continue reading at home, your child can use their login details received at school, to complete readers set by their classroom teacher, at home. Your child is using **Mathletics** as part of their mathematics program at school. Mathletics is a targeted, rewarding and captivating online learning resource, which is aligned to curriculum standards. Your child has take-home access to Mathletics – they simply sign in with their school username and password using any compatible computer or mobile device. The extra Mathletics practice at home can make all the difference to your child's progress. Encourage them to achieve a weekly target of 1000 points to earn a certificate, building through bronze, silver and gold across the school year. Go for gold! www.mathletics.com



ABC Reading Eggs is designed to get your child motivated and excited about reading. Your child will now be able to access the program in class and at home. They will work through the program at their own pace, focusing on phonics, letters, vocabulary, sight words, fluency and comprehension. **Reading Eggspress** is designed to build on reading and comprehension skills, and is usually for students in grades 2 onwards (7–13 year olds). There is also a built in library, where once again students can access a wide range of ebooks.



Sunshine Online offers schools the very best in animated and interactive digital content for Literacy and early Numeracy. The range of content options directly support our Curriculum. Animated and interactive, Sunshine Online offers an extensive digital learning environment with quality content for use in Literacy and Numeracy programs. The e-books are levelled so that teachers can choose where to start and therefore motivate them to progress through the levels. The program can be accessed via an app or:

SCHOOL TIMES
