Planning for 2026

It's that time of year that we begin planning for 2026, class structures and our recruitment process. Mobile Phone and Smart Watch Policy:

Through thorough discussion with our School Council, from the beginning of 2026, our school will be implementing the Department of Education's policy in relation to communication devices. In addition to the existing Mobile Phone Policy, this will now include smart watches. Therefore, any smart watch will be required to follow the same guidelines and restrictions as mobile phones.

This change reflects the impact of potential distractions to learning, the risks of unsupervised technology use and the challenges of monitoring online communications. By aligning with the Department's policy, we want to continue to ensure a safe, focused, and supportive learning environment for all students.

We understand that this adjustment may raise questions for some parents, and as a school we welcome open communication on this adjusted policy. Families are encouraged to reach out to the school office to speak to our leadership team with any questions. Further details will be provided to families closer to the implementation date.

We also encourage families to continue promoting healthy and balanced technology use at home, reinforcing the importance of face-to-face connections, responsible online behaviour, and clear routines around device use.



Traffic Safety:

A reminder to all families to please take extra care when parking around the school, collecting children, and using the designated school crossing. We also encourage students who may be walking home without a parent to do so safely by using the crossing, being mindful of traffic, and walking directly home. REPORTING TO FAMILIES

Throughout the year, student progress is reported to families in various ways. At the beginning of each term, student goals in key learning areas are communicated via Progressive Reports. Throughout the year, achievements are added to this report aswell.

At the end of Term 2 and Term 4, academic reports are provided to families outlining the student achievement against the Victorian Curriculum. NAPLAN RESULTS

This year the NAPLAN assessments took place in Term 1 from March 12th-March 24th. We have received our school results and individual student results were sent home last month.

We are extremely proud of the efforts of all our students and teachers as they have been able to achieve very pleasing overall outcomes.


In each of the 5 domains- Reading, Writing, Spelling, Grammar & Punctuation and Numeracy, our Year 3 and Year 5 students performed higher than schools in our network and schools that are deemed similar to us (school size, demographic) in 9 out of the 10 categories. This is an amazing achievement!!

Buzz Leaders in Action - Term 3

Our Buzz Leaders have been busy engaging in some fantastic leadership opportunities this term.

Recently, our Year 5 and 6 Buzz Leaders visited Aspire Early Education & Kindergarten in Wollert. They spent time with the kinder students, supporting their learning and play while practising their own leadership skills and role modelling. It was a wonderful chance to build positive community connections and demonstrate the values of kindness and responsibility.







Meanwhile, our Year 2–4 Buzz Leaders have been working on an important project closer to home. At the end of Term 2, the Year 3s conducted a data collection task during their Maths Modelling sessions, investigating the amount of rubbish on our school oval. They have already shared their findings at a Buzz Leaders meeting, and the next step is for students to brainstorm possible solutions to present to leadership. Ideas include trialling temporary bins or introducing rubbish monitors to help reduce litter on the oval.

We are incredibly proud of the initiative, problem solving, and leadership skills our Buzz Leaders are demonstrating, and we look forward to seeing the impact of their work across our school community.

We are incredibly proud of all HHPS students for their commitment to our school-wide expectations: Being Respectful, Being Safe, and Being Your Best.


We look forward to seeing students continue their strong engagement, working towards new milestones and exchanging badges for a variety of exciting rewards.

Vic SWPBS

Over the past term, HHPS has taken part in two important surveys as part of the Vic SWPBS initiative. These surveys provide us with valuable insights, helping us to celebrate our successes while also identifying areas where we can continue to grow.

Self-Assessment Survey



Tiered Fidelity Inventory

During week 5, HHPS was involved in the completion of a survey called the Tiered Fidelity Inventory (TFI). The TFI is a globally recognised assessment tool used by SWPBS schools to measure how effectively we are implementing the SWPBS framework within our school community. The results help us identify our strengths and areas for improvement, allowing us to set meaningful goals and ensure we are implementing the framework with fidelity to best support our students.

The SWPBS coach from the North-Eastern Melbourne Area visited the school to complete the survey and meet with the Positive Climate Team.

The coach randomly selected 10 staff members and 11 students from across the school. The survey was anonymous, verbal and took less than two minutes.

The results indicated that of the staff surveyed:

- 100% could list school-wide expectations
- •100% have explicitly taught expected behaviours to students this term
- •100% have given a tangible reward in the past week

In addition to this:

- •73% of students could list the school-wide expectations
- •82% of students surveyed have received a hero stamp in the past two months







Online Programs
